Listen and enjoy the *I'm a Spring Chicken* song, joining in where they can to the chorus:

Watch a chick hatch from its egg:



You could use words like, *laid*, *hatch*, *peck*, *tiny*, *fluffy*, *feathers*. Your child could write about what
they have seen. Encourage them to use their
phonics to write independently.

Watch and enjoy the nursery rhyme *Chick, Chick, Chick, Chick, Chick, Chick, Chicken*:

Spring Chicken



When following links online, parents should monitor that children are remaining on that page only and are keeping safe online.

Listen and enjoy the story of Hattie Peck by Emma Levey https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=HxmfzZy6kEA&t=58s

Ask your child questions such as, What does Hattie Peck want most of all?, How do you think she feels?, Where does she look for eggs? etc. Retell the story looking back through where she looked to find the eggs, encouraging your child to use words from the book, e.g. clambered, trekked, soared, etc. Ask your child to write how Hattie Peck was feeling at the beginning and at the end of the story, e.g. She was sad/happy. They may think of better words such as miserable/amazing and write them down. This could be in the form of a sentence, if they are able to. They could write a list of the things Hattie Peck might need for her journey to put in her suitcase, e.g. toothbrush, bag, shampoo.

Following on from reading the story of Hattie Peck, find out about which animals lays eggs.

Draw pictures of them and label them such as *penguins*, *crocodiles*, *flamingos*. At this age the children will use their phonics to help them spell the words and should be encouraged to write the labels independently with their phonic knowledge.

Ask your child what they know about chickens. Write some questions about what they would like to know about them, e.g. *Why do chickens have feathers? How many eggs do they lay?*

Discuss what they have heard and write a simple fact file about chickens. They could also draw pictures and label them, e.g. *feathers, beak, two legs, yellow, fluffy, tiny eyes, etc.*

 Write the words underneath each part, e.g. lay, egg, hatch, chicken. They could write some sentences about each part if they are able to.
